

Samil Battenfeld (*Percy*) has taken many WFT classes and appeared in *The Wizard of Oz* (Munchkin, Flying Monkey), *Charlotte's Web* (Baby Spider), and *Aladdin* (Slave of the Lamp), the latter alongside his sisters Priya and Varsha. He loves soccer, drawing, playing the violin, and playing Pokemon.

She has appeared in a short film on bullying with Project Aware and in Miracle on 34th Street (Susan Walker), The Secret Garden (Mary Lennox), ANNIE (July), Alice in Wonderland Jr. (Tweedle Dee), Seussical Jr. (Gertrude), Revels Repertory and Christmas Revels performances (children's ensemble), and JMBT's Nutcracker (Polichinelle). Next up is Artbarn's production of ANNIE.

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



Brittany Rolfs (Annie Sullivan), a 2009 graduate of Milton High, has worked extensively with the school's Drama Club.
