

considered the trial of the 20th century.





She has been living and working in MA since 1971, and has been an ASL/English interpreter for the past 32 years. Inherit the Wind is her third Wheelock production; she also interpreted last season's The Witch of Blackbird Pond. Janice has also interpreted Broadway road show productions of Annie, Fiddler on the Roof (with Theodore Bikel), and Titanic.
