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
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Dear Theatre-goer,

Happy 2001! It is a year that has already gotten off to a busy and exciting start for the Wheelock Family Theatre. On January 13, Jane Staab and I were honored to receive the Our Place Theatre Project's African American Theatre Festival Award for our "unwavering commitment to diversity in Boston theatre" in a ceremony at the Boston Center for the Arts. This is the kind of recognition that validates our mission to make professional theatre experiences accessible to multicultural and intergenerational audiences. Our sincere thanks, again, to Jacqui Parker and her colleagues for this wonderful honor.

We are thrilled to produce Thomas Olson's dramatically charged adaptation of Mark Twain's classic brought from the page to the stage by one of our favorite guest directors, Jim Byrne. There is a great deal of food for thought in this play. Young people and adults will appreciate the ways in which Edward and Tom come to an understanding of what it means to have a noble heart. They learn that a noble heart develops from an impulse toward generosity and compassion, an impulse which they both eventually discover within themselves. The play is a powerful reminder that true knowledge of other people comes from knowing them and understanding their lives as individuals and not as members of a class.

In the next three months, we have much to look forward to. In February, our Education Program will kick off the year with a Vacation Week Institute focusing on the great roles for young people. (See the enclosed flyer for information.) March 1 - 11 we are excited to stage in our black box theatre the world premiere of *My Hands Remember*, a work inspired by the life of a deaf, Jewish woman who lived in Nazi-occupied Europe. It is a story of love and sacrifice for love, a story of survival and transformation. Also in March, our spring session of classes gets underway. Along with showers, April brings a second Vacation Week Institute and the New England premiere of *Lilly's Purple Plastic Purse* -- a rousing finish for our production season. And, on May 20th, we hope you will join us for The Greatest Cast and Crew Party Ever to commemorate our 20th anniversary season.

I look forward to seeing you at one (or all) of these activities, and I hope you enjoy your time with us today in Tudor England.




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# WHO'S WHO WET

At the Lyric, he has also appeared as the Balladeer in Assassins and in many roles in When Pigs Fly. Other regional credits include Henrik in A Little Night Music and Society Max in Guys and Dolls at the Publick; Representative Thibideau in American Stage Festival's world premiere of The People's House, and Whizzer in Falsettos at the Firehouse and Triangle Theatres.



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
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
