When Potato tells his friends he's worried, he expects them to comfort him by saying that everything will be okay. Except they don't. Because it might not be, and that's okay too.




# When My Worries Get Too Big!: A Relaxation Book for Children who Live with Anxiety by Kari Dunn Buron

Feelings are neither good nor bad, they simply are. Kids need words to name their feelings, just as they need words to name all things in their world.




## Tiger Davs: A Book of Feelings by M.H. Clark


#### Listening with My Heart: A Story of Kindness and Self-Compassion by Gabi Garcia


#### When Worry Takes Hold by Liz Haske


# What to Do When You Worry Too Much: A Kid's Guide to Overcoming Anxiety by Dawn Huebner and Bonnie Matthews

#### What Happens Next by Claire Swinarski






Beautiful Oops by Barney Saltzberg




## Blood Water Paint by Joy McCullough


The War That Saved My Life by Kimberly Brubaker Bradley

This book is a powerful combination of graphic novel and picture book that accounts the author's experience growing up in Czechoslovakia under Soviet rule.










#### Little Women by Louisa May Alcott

This book chronicles the joys and sorrows of the four March sisters as they grow into young women in mid-nineteenth-century New England.




## When Stars Are Scattered by Victoria Jamieson


## Inside Out and Back Again by Thanhhà Lai








#### With the Fire on High by Elizabeth Acevedo


# The Prince of los Cocuyos: A Miami Childhood by Richard Blanco


## The Best We Could Do by Thi Bui

Sustained by the hope of someday owning a farm of their own, two migrant laborers arrive to work on a ranch in central California.








A Is for Audra: Broadway's Leading Ladies From A to Z by John Robert Allman


## Stand Up, Yumi Chung! by Jessica Kim


Drama, Drama, Drama--on stage and off, as seen through the eyes of theatre loving Callie, who is working on the stage crew of her middle school's production.

Five friends in a high-pressure NYC Performing Arts High School prepare for their final performances that will determine their futures--all the while thinking about a tragic event that changed everything.








Vinegar Girl by Anne Tyler




#### Red Scarf Girl by Ji-Li Jiang
